# **Health Professional School Information**

Many careers in healthcare require a graduate or professional degree. There are a variety of majors and minors that will prepare you for health professional graduate programs; however most of these programs require pre-requisite courses.

Students interested in medicine, dentistry, podiatry, optometry, veterinary medicine, and chiropractic medicine should consult the <u>Office of Pre-Health Advising and Mentoring</u>, and open a premed file in Ungar 103. Additionally, students should refer to the PreHealth Student Guidelines provided by this Office and attend the application information sessions. They can be contacted at <u>prehealth@miami.edu</u>.

Many health professional schools use centralized application services and it is in the applicant's best interest to apply and submit all application materials as soon as the application service begins accepting applications, typically the summer before the applicant intends to enroll. Please keep in mind that even though many schools participate in the centralized application services, some do not. It is your responsibility to research each program's pre-requisite courses and admission requirements.

Below is a list of health professional schools not advised by the Office of Pre -Health Advising and Mentoring. The information below is intended to help you find a list of accredited programs in your area of interest. After you identify programs of interest, you should make a list of required pre -requisite courses, clinical hours, and other admissions requirements. It is important to plan ahead so you can gain experience, take pre-requisite courses, and prepare for and take the necessary entrance exam. International students may need to take the TOEFL in addition to the exam mentioned below.

#### Master of Science in Nursing (MSN)

### Nursing- Accelerated baccalaureate programs (BSN)

- Accelerated baccalaureate programs offer the quickest route to licensure as a registered
- nurse (RN) for adults who have already completed a bachelor's or graduate degree in a nonnursing discipline
- Fast-track baccalaureate programs take between 11 and 18 months to complete, including
- prerequisites
